



STUDY PROGRAMMES

Given the multicultural tradition of our University, the 21 faculties within Babeş-Bolyai offer a wide range of specializations in Romanian (R), but also in Hungarian (H), German (G), English (E), French (F), etc.



The largest fields of education are:

- Mathematics and Natural Sciences,
- Biology and Biomedical Sciences,
- Engineering sciences,
- Social Sciences,
- Humanities and Art.

This student guide offers a general presentation of the faculties, but in order to find the programme that best fits your interests and carrier goals you have to undergo a more extensive search of our study offer, since it is constantly improved and adapted to the new international context. Thus, you can seek information about the different study programmes on the university's website, or directly from the faculties. Contact details are available on the university's website and in this student guide.

Our University is currently implementing the Bologna Declaration, and this means that we are in a transition phase. Beginning with the 2005/2006 academic year, at bachelor level we have 3 years study programmes and master programmes will last 2 years. However, the old system of 4 year bachelor studies will also operate for another few years, so graduation currently requires that after 3



or 4 years for bachelor degrees and 1 or 2 years for master degrees, students have to pass the final examination and defend a final paper (license paper).

Study programmes offer some flexibility to students, allowing them to build their own “portfolio” of competencies, in the sense that the curricula includes compulsory courses (offering basic training for that particular specialization) but also elective courses (that can be taken by the students from the curricula of the faculty they are attending).

Note: To find the study programme that best fits your preferences and professional interests please conduct an in-depth research of our academic offer.

During an academic year, for each subject of study you may take the examination twice.

Failure to pass a subject that was included in your learning agreement means that you have to re-register for that subject and pay a fee according to the number of credits allocated to that course.



That is why you have to ensure that you fully understand what is expected of you. There are precise requirements for each subject, and a breach of these rules may lead to penalties.
